As with all library events, this one will be free.

The program includes *Trio in A Minor, Op. 188* by Carl Reinecke for oboe, horn and piano, *Suite* by Alexandre Tansman for oboe, clarinet and bassoon, and *Quintet in E flat Major, K452* by W.A. Mozart for winds and piano. Note that seating for Live Music at the Library events is limited.
