Kennedy Center honors SU student-produced play

A student-produced play at Southwestern University has been recognized by the 2002 National Awards of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival.

G.H.O.S.T Unit: The Live Event was honored for "Special Achievement of Innovative Theatrical Experience."

The hybrid production is the work of students Campbell Duffy '22, Jamie Hotaling '23, and Dane Parker '22.

Working with professors Sergio Costola and CB Goodman in their Devised Theater class, the students were tasked with developing a performance for the world-renowned Edinburgh Fringe Festival in August.

Devised theater works are collaborative and begin without a script. Collaborators decide on what stories they want to tell and which characters to develop. The script is written as rehearsals proceed.

Based on Anton Chekov's play, *The Cherry Orchard, G.H.O.S.T Unit: The Live Event* spoofs reality television shows about ghost-hunting. It also addresses modern issues, takes place in four separate theater spaces, and coalesces on Zoom.

Actors performed before

a live audience in separate theaters. Each is in front of a green screen and controls their own camera and relies on their invisible assistant to help them with puppets and props.

The students stay in character, act and make sure the technology is working properly. They each have a table with a mechanical arm that holds the camera, two monitors, a mini-mixer to control the sound and a stream deck to help them customize their streaming process.

Biographies on bulldogger Bill Pickett

hen Netflix released the film *The Harder They Fall* last year, I became very excited as it was set to feature one of my favorite Williamson County stories, that of cowboy Bill Pickett.

From the outset, writer and director Jeymes Samuel made it clear the film presents a fictionalized version of historical figures and events. The goal of the film was to highlight that African Americans comprised about one quarter of cowboys in the late 1800s.

In the film, Pickett is presented as a member of Nat Love's gang. In reality, Willie M. "Bill" Pickett was born in Jenks Branch, Texas on December 5, 1870. Also known as the Miller Community after the brothers Milas, Richard, and Nelson, Jenks Branch was a freedom colony founded by the Miller brothers when they purchased land near Liberty Hill shortly after the Civil War. Freedom colonies, or freedman's towns, are communities founded by freed African American individuals and families.

By 1888, the family moved

across Williamson County to Taylor. While working as a ranch hand, Pickett developed a certain skill: bulldogging, now known as steer wrestling. The legend is that Pickett observed dogs wrestling steers to the ground by biting their lower lip and decided he could do the same. By biting the lower lip, it stunned the steer long enough for Pickett to wrestle the 500-600 pound animal to the ground.

It should be noted, Pickett stood at only five foot seven. He soon began performing at fairs and rodeos, often emphasizing his mother's Cherokee heritage, or claiming he was Comanche, as certain shows did not allow African Americans to perform.

Pickett married Maggie Turner in 1890, and together they raised nine children. To support his growing family, Pickett and his brothers began the Pickett Brothers Bronco Busters and Rough Riders Association in Taylor. However, he continued performing and hit a breakthrough in 1904, when he performed in front of 20,000 people at Cheyenne Frontier Days in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

The following year, Zack Miller of the 101 Ranch in Oklahoma traveled to Fort Worth to watch Pickett bulldog. Pickett joined the famous 101 Ranch Wild West Show, which featured Buffalo Bill, Will Rogers and more. Performing under the name "The Dusky Demon," he traveled the world with the show.

After retiring from bulldogging, Pickett continued working as a cowboy and rancher. He appeared in two silent films, The Bull-Dogger and The Crimson Skull in the early 1920s. In March 1932, Pickett was kicked in the head by a horse. After several days in a coma, he passed on April 2, 1932.

Will Rogers announced the funeral on his radio show, stating, "Bill Pickett never had an enemy, even the steers wouldn't hurt old Bill." His funeral took place on the 101 Ranch, and over 1,000 people attended.

In 1972, Bill Pickett became the first Black athlete to be inducted into the National Rodeo Hall of Fame. In 1989, he was enshrined into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame and the Museum of the American Cowboy. To this day, the Bill Pickett Invitational Rodeo is the largest and longest running rodeo celebrating Black cowboys.

Unfortunately, the Georgetown Public Library does not have a DVD copy of "The Harder They Fall" available to borrow. Films released by proprietary streaming services and declining sales mean that many films and shows are not being released on DVD at all.

However, the library does have "Bill Pickett, Bulldogger: the Biography of a Black Cowboy" by Bailey C. Haynes and "The New Black West: Photographs from America's only Touring Black Rodeo" by Gabriela Hasbun if you are interested in learning more about this local icon.
