Since the repeal of Prohibition, the State of Texas allows elections to be held in either counties, justice of the peace precincts, or municipal city limits. There are now ten different versions of legal alcohol sales.

different versions of legia auconossaies.

There have been more than twenty local option efforts in Williamson County including three that affected the City of Georgetown. In 2004, Georgetown voters approved beer and wine sales in retail stores and mixed beverage sales in restaurants. In 2010, voters approved all alcohol sales inside the city limits.

However, the property now known as Wolf Lakes Village was not annexed into the city limits until 2017. Since the elections in 2004 and 2010, the city has annexed more land, but the "wet-dry" status that was in effect prior to annexation remains in force. To have the rules apply to all of Georgetown, state law requires an election to be held in the city's current boundaries.
